New Artist Residency and Exchange in Fergus Falls, MN

Springboard for the Arts has a new artist residency and exchange in Fergus Falls, MN by the name of Falls Community Arts Exchange. It is open to artists, creatives, culture bearers, community leaders, or travelers who want to experience the local arts community of Otter Tail County.

They are now accepting applications for the Artist Track of the exchange. This career development track is for individual artists interested in deep exchange with rural creative ecosystems, and who are interested in completing a collaborative project that supports local community goals through creative engagement. Visiting artists receive a \$4,500 stipend and spend 4 weeks living in Fergus Falls, where they receive support and coaching from Springboard staff, connect with local artists, and work on a modest collaborative project with a local organization.

2023 McKnight Visual Artist Fellowship Application Now Open

The McKnight Visual Artist Fellowship program rewards Minnesota visual artists whose work is of exceptional artistic merit and who have created a substantial body of work to be at a career stage beyond emerging. This year a total of six \$25,000 fellowships will be awarded. In addition, the Visual Artist fellows will have the opportunity to meet with five visiting national critics, to participate in a McKnight Discussion Series that features fellows and invited critics, to attend a 1–2 week artist residency through Artists Community Alliance (ACA), and to use additional funds for individualized professional development activities.

The deadline to <u>apply</u> is Friday, March 22 at 12:00 p.m.

2025 Jerome Hill Artist Fellowship

This Fellowship supports artists working in Dance; Film, Video and Digital Production; Literature; Music; Technology Centered Arts; Theater/Performance/Spoken Word; and Visual Arts, who embrace their roles as part of a larger community of artists and citizens, and consciously work with a sense of service and responsibility.

Support is directed to early career artists, which Jerome Foundation defines as within the 2nd–10th year as a generative artist. Fellows receive \$60,000 over three consecutive years (\$20,000 each year) to support time and expenses for the creation of new work, artistic development, and/or professional artistic career development. The Foundation expects to award a total of 45 fellowships across 7 artistic fields.

The application is now open. The deadline is Monday, April 15 by 4:00 p.m. Central time/5:00 p.m. Eastern time.

FACULTY ACTIVITIES

Alexis Schramel Publishes Article in The International Journal of Lifelong Learning in Art Education

Alexis Schramel has published the article entitled "The Ritual of Therapeutic Artmaking in Long-Term Care" in The International Journal of Lifelong Learning in Art Education Volume 6 (2023). Schramel's research has been part of multi-year art programming in long-term care facilities with former professors Elissa Cox Wenthe and Melinda Heinz both of Upper Iowa University. The transition to long-term care settings can be difficult for residents and feelings of Ioneliness, depression, and anxiety are not uncommon in these environments. However, participating in therapeutic artmaking rituals creates opportunities for residents to process their feelings, experience states of flow and mindfulness, engage with others, and focus on their psychological growth. In long-term care, the physical needs of residents are often prioritized, but psychosocial needs also require attention. For this project, therapeutic artmaking rituals were created at a long-term care facility in three levels of care over 12 months. Older adults engaged with clay, paint, raw fiber, and wood. Reflections and recommendations for artists interested in creating similar programming are discussed. Suggestions for future research on therapeutic artmaking rituals are also included, such as the consideration of artist-in-residence programs within long-term care settings and assessing how the ritual of engaging in therapeutic artmaking could improve person-centered care and resident and staff dynamics.

ACADEMIC CABINET AND CURRICULUM MEETINGS

Cabinet 1-24-24

We began with a check-in around the room. Robert reminded everyone to ensure that emergency contact information is up-to-date in Human Resources and to encourage faculty to do the same. We had a conversation about the start of the term. One challenge that surfaced was related to add/drop and students enrolled in an afternoon studio course who would like to drop it, not being able to due to the system closing before the end of the class. River suggested we move the deadline later into the evening on the last day to add/drop. Some concerns were raised in relation to course selections being made based on conjecture related to individual faculty and not necessarily the merits of a course. We also discussed ways to support our new students in their transition to college and more about the professional accomplishments of our faculty in their related fields and how that is different from high school. Robert will integrate some of this into his presentation during new student orientation. We then had a presentation by Grace Bridgeford, Alumni Relations, and Jim Howley, Accreditation and Assessment, on the SNAAP (Strategic National Arts Alumni Project) survey from 2022.

Curriculum 1-31-24

We began with a check-in around the room. Melissa Huybrecht shared information related to the new FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) form and the impact that the government delaying its release is having on all of higher education. Gerald Ronning made a work-in-progress presentation on the proposed new minor in Curatorial Studies. In addition, Gerald also pointed out that art history courses do not automatically count as Liberal Arts electives and the group agreed that it was appropriate to allow these courses to count as electives going forward. There was a conversation related to realizing the Academic Year Appointments for adjuncts and coming to a collective

understanding of the process, including cross-department requests. It was agreed that eligible faculty should be encouraged to apply. It was also agreed that there is no requirement to apply and that not applying should not diminish the likelihood of being assigned to teach course(s). Lara Roy, Dawn Keene, and Olaf Khulke presented the final draft of the Creative Entrepreneurship and MA in Sustainable Design accelerated BS/MA program proposal. A working group presented initial work on revising the college's Equity and Inclusion statement – additional feedback was requested and we will revisit it during a subsequent meeting. We revisited the Institutional Learning Outcomes and Jim solicited feedback for making minor revisions.
