Liberal Arts Visiting Faculty Search Candidate Presentations <u>Art History</u> Yijing Wang Friday, March 26, noon-1:00 p.m. Join on Zoom!

Yijing Wang is PhD Candidate in the Frick Department of History of Art and Architecture at the University of Pittsburgh. He specializes in contemporary Chinese art with a transnational focus on language-based practices. His research examines the conceptual and material dimensions of artists' physical acts of inscribing in transcultural representations among and between East Asia, Europe, and the United States since the 1980s. Based on his working relationship with living artists, his current book project, "Inscribing Sinoscape: Script and Representation in Post-Mao Chinese Art, 1985-Present,"investigates the global landscape in which Chinese artists deploy unconventional material forms and media from indigenous traditions as specific scripts, writing styles, typographies, and their material carriers: talismans, scrolls, sutras, and steles, to articulate their social critique and cultural identity. It poses the question to all art historians, curators, critics, artists, and art students: what counts as contemporary art practice today?

Cristin McKnight Sethi Friday, April 2, noon-1:00 p.m. Join on <u>Zoom!</u>

Cristin McKnight Sethi is an assistant professor of Art History at the Corcoran School of the Arts and Design at George Washington University (GW). She holds a Ph.D. in Art History from the University of California, Berkeley (2015) and a Master's in Art History from the University of Texas at Austin (2008). Her research and teaching interests focus on South and Southeast Asia and include the study of textiles and vernacular art, the intersection of gender and practices of making, networks of circulation and exchange, and histories of colonialism and British imperialism. Prior to joining the faculty at GW, Cristin taught at the California College of the Arts and at Colorado College. She has held curatorial and research positions at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, the UCLA Fowler Museum, the Asian Art Museum San Francisco, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, and the Museum of International Folk Art in Santa Fe, New Mexico. Cristin's current book project examines gender, labor, and hand embroidery in Punjab during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

Fulla Abdul-Jabbar is a writer, artist, editor, and curator living in Brooklyn. She teaches in the Department of Writing at the Pratt Institute where she was awarded an AICAD

Postgraduate Teaching Fellowship and is Editor and Curator at the Green Lantern Press.

In her work, she is primarily interested in the ways language constructs experience and an understanding of self. This manifests in visual art, performance, editorial projects, curatorial projects, and experimental writing and criticism. She has created projects regarding her previous career as a biochemist and the scientific poster session, PowerPoint as an emotive container, and exquisite corpses. In all of her work there is a fundamental question of structure. What are the structures we build that simultaneously engender and limit expression? Why do we return to forms that often fail us?

She has performed, screened, or exhibited nationally and internationally including at the Electronic Literature Organization, the Altered Aesthetics Film Festival, the Brussels Independent Film Festival, and the Ann Arbor Film Festival. Her writing has appeared in DIAGRAM, Bombay Gin, Jellyfish Review, Passages North, Northwest Review, Prairie Schooner, and elsewhere. She received her B.S. in Biochemistry from the University of Michigan and M.A. in Visual & Critical Studies from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago.

#### Piotr Szyhalski / Labor Camp – COVID-19: Labor Camp Report

#### March 18 - August 14

On March 24, 2020, Minneapolis-based artist Piotr Szyhalski embarked on a daily drawing practice, responding to the COVID-19 pandemic as it unfolded in real time. What began as a way for the artist to share observations of life in lockdown and the pain caused by the pandemic, soon became an exercise in chronicling his thoughts and feelings, reconciling them with the changes being wrought in the world.

COVID-19: Labor Camp Report consists of 225 drawings created over eight months, with new drawings posted daily on Instagram, a witness to the unfolding crisis and a record of time both labored and lost.
