Reminder of Guests & Visitors Policy

A reminder to faculty about MCAD's guest/visitors policy as it relates to in-person guest faculty or classroom guests as outlined in the <u>Preparedness Plan</u>.

We are currently limiting guests/visitors to campus. Certain guests/visitors are allowed with prior permission; for example, students are allowed to have guests on campus to assist them in the production of their coursework with prior approval of Academic Affairs or Student Affairs.

We have no provisions for in-person guest faculty or classroom guests for an on-campus demonstration in the Preparedness Plan. However, if an MCAD faculty member wishes to have a guest faculty or classroom guest in-person on campus they must request permission for the visit in advance from Academic Affairs. Also, as per the Plan:

"In all cases, anyone allowing guests/visitors into the academic buildings should ensure that visitors are escorted at all times and follow all college-established protocols while on campus. These guests have an important role in safeguarding the health of our community members by following MCAD's established Plan."

Fatimah Tuggar Monday, April 19, noon-1:00 p.m. Join on Zoom!

Multidisciplinary artist Fatimah Tuggar was born in Nigeria and raised there and in the United Kingdom. She has studied, lived, and worked in the US since the late '80s. Her work uses technology as both medium and subject to serve as metaphors for power dynamics. She combines objects, images, and sounds from diverse cultures, geographies, and histories to comment on how media and technology diversely impact local and global realities.

Tuggar's work has been widely exhibited at international venues in over twenty-five countries. Tuggar's art education covers three continents and a broader range of disciplines, traditions, processes, and materials. Her work has been the subject of various panels, articles, academic curricula in multiple disciplines and discussions.

Tuggar has been teaching for 14 years, and her students have gone on to have productive careers in art and technology. She has been a contributor to academic journals and books and given over a hundred lectures, artist talks and workshops at numerous institutions globally.

She has produced commissioned works for many institutions, including the Museum of Modern Art, New York; the Bronx Museum of the Arts, New York; Nordic Institute of Contemporary Art, Copenhagen, Denmark, to name a few. Tuggar has received many accolades, including the 2003 Prix Special du Jury at Les Rencontres in Bamako, Mali; the Young with FIA Award in Caracas, Venezuela in 2002, a 2008 W. A. Mellon Research Fellowship and a Guggenheim Creative Arts Fellowship, 2019.

She received her BFA from the University of Kentucky and was a Danforth Scholar at Washington University in St. Louis, where she received her MFA in visual art. Currently, she is an Assistant Professor at Mississippi State University. Ming is passionate about pedagogical approaches to Foundations that involve critical engagement, experimentation, and social equity. She serves on the Foundation of Art: Theory and Education (FATE) Guidelines committee working to develop a document to further support Foundations educators and students.

Patience L. Lueth is an assistant teaching professor with the Architecture Department at lowa State University. Since the beginning of her professional career Patience has enjoyed the art of teaching at the first- and second-year level. She has earned a doctorate in Educational Leadership and Policy Studies, and a Master's of Science in Architectural Studies, where her research focused on learning experiences of students in architecture design studios, architecture studio culture and learner-centered assessment in design education.

She is currently the Design Studies 102 (a core design studio) Director and teaches courses in the Architecture Program, Interdisciplinary Design and Design Programs, some of which give students the opportunity to work with tangible clients in the community. She engages in curricular improvement and development strategies through the assessment of learning outcomes in her role as instructor and director. One of her current projects include co-directing the Wearables Design Show, where the first-year students showcase their kinetic designs through the study of modularity, which was born out of the result of an assessment.

Dr. Lueth has been a supporter and advocate for the foundations' programs in the College of Design, by advising students and also teaching design workshops with the intent of engaging the K-12 population in design-related activities and learning strategies. Her main goal is to see students succeed in their studies and grow as leaders in design, through the intentional organization of interdisciplinary and collaborative efforts of faculty and staff in the design discipline and beyond.

Dandona Presents Paper at Int'l Conference: Scottish Society of the History of Medicine: Teaching Anatomy from Classical to Modern
